Explore Eaves Wood



Victorian terraces and promenades make Eaves Wood near Hebden Bridge a fascinating place to discover.



Eaves Wood has lots of terraces and flights of stone steps, almost certainly built in the late nineteenth century. Nobody, quite knows why these paths were built, making Eaves Wood one of Hebden Bridge's most intriguing landscapes. Despite not being on the OS map, all the paths are open to all. We give you three starting points, but then wander at will.

Discover Eaves Wood for yourself

Starting from Heptonstall

Walk or get the 596 bus to Heptonstall

 From the church, leave the cemetery on your right and cross Hepton Drive. Immediately turn right on the footpath signed Calderdale Way. At the end of the path (fine views) descend, going down some stone steps to an old Quarry called Hell Hole racks. Keep ahead and after 20 metres, take the flight of steps on your left.

From Eaves, Mytholm

Walk or get the 598 bus to Eaves

 From the far end of Eaves Avenue/Ragley View Road take the track on your right which runs up into the woods.

From Hebden Bridge

3. Walk on the main road towards Todmorden, passing Fox and Goose pub. Shortly after (opp. Mytholm Close), take the waymarked path right through the woods. Continue past a house, to find a track on your right which takes you into Eaves Wood.
